



NEOCLASSICISM

is a musical trend that was popular in the 20th century

Interesting Facts:

- "Neo" means new, "classical" means using the elements from the Classical music period (late 17th, 18th centuries)
- Neoclassical composers were imitating the style of 17th and 18th centuries
- The music sounds unique and fresh - a mixture of classical style and modernization of the harmonies
- Emphasis on rhythm, contrapuntal texture and expanded harmony are main features of style
- This musical trend was popular between two World Wars (1920-1950), although some composers wrote in neoclassical style earlier (19th century)
- The most known neoclassical piece: ballet "Pulcinella" by Igor Stravinsky (sometime called a neo-baroque composition because the composer imitates the Baroque style)
- Composers favored works for smaller ensembles and used lighter textures
- American composers Ellior Carter and Aaron Copland were influenced by neoclassicism too

Origin of neoclassicism:

- Took its roots as a response to overly emotional romanticism and atonal music trend (atonal music is the music that lacks the tonal center which makes it sound at times chaotic)
- The trend was started by Igor Stravinsky and then was supported by other composers
- Although composers before composed the pieces in this style, because of Stravinsky it became a trend that lasted for about 30 years
